We have conducted a compliance audit of the Fallowfield Township Non-Uniformed Union Pension Plan for the period January 1, 2020 to December 31, 2022. We also evaluated compliance with some requirements subsequent to that period when possible. The audit was conducted pursuant to authority derived from the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (Act 205 of 1984, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.402(j)), which requires the Auditor General, as deemed necessary, to audit every municipality which receives general municipal pension system state aid and every municipal pension plan and fund in which general municipal pension system state aid is deposited. The audit was not conducted, nor was it required to be, in accordance with Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. We planned and performed the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our finding and conclusions based on our audit objectives. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our finding and conclusions based on our audit objectives.

The objectives of the audit were:

- 1. To determine if municipal officials took appropriate corrective action to address the finding contained in our prior report; and
- 2. To determine if the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies.

Our audit was limited to the areas related to the objectives identified above. To determine if municipal officials took appropriate corrective action to address the finding contained in our prior report, we inquired of plan officials and evaluated supporting documentation provided by officials evidencing that the suggested corrective action has been appropriately taken. To determine whether the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies, our methodology included the following:

- We determined whether state aid was properly determined and deposited in accordance with Act 205 requirements by verifying the annual deposit date of state aid and determining whether deposits were made within 30 days of receipt for all years within the period under audit. State aid allocations that were deposited into the pension plan for the years ended December 31, 2017 to December 31, 2022, are presented on the Summary of Deposited State Aid and Employer Contributions.
- We determined whether annual employer contributions were calculated and deposited in accordance with the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations by examining the municipality's calculation of the plan's annual financial requirements and minimum municipal obligation (MMO) and comparing these calculated amounts to amounts actually budgeted and deposited into the pension plan as evidenced by supporting documentation. Employer contributions that were deposited into the pension plan for the years ended December 31, 2017 to December 31, 2022, are presented on the Summary of Deposited State Aid and Employer Contributions.
- We determined that there were no employee contributions required by the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations for the years covered by our audit period.
- We determined that there were no benefit calculations prepared for the years covered by our audit period.
- We determined whether the January 1, 2021 and January 1, 2023 actuarial valuation reports were prepared and submitted by March 31, 2022 and 2024, respectively, in accordance with Act 205 and whether selected information provided on these reports is accurate, complete, and in accordance with plan provisions to ensure compliance for participation in the state aid program by comparing selected information to supporting source documentation.
- We determined whether all payments made to the multi-employer union pension plan were in accordance with the provisions contained in the collective bargaining agreement for the period January 1, 2020 to December 31, 2022.

The township's non-uniformed union employees participate in the Steelworker's Pension Trust, a Taft-Hartley Act collectively bargained, jointly trusteed, multi-employer pension plan, which is governed primarily by the Federal Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). ERISA provides for substantial federal government oversight of the operating and reporting practices of employee benefit plans subject to its provisions. Accordingly, the scope of our audit was restricted to the activities of the Fallowfield Township Non-Uniformed Union Pension Plan and did not extend to the activities of the multi-employer pension plan.

Township officials are responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that the Fallowfield Township Non-Uniformed Union Pension Plan is administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies. As previously described, we tested transactions, interviewed selected officials, and performed procedures to the extent necessary to provide reasonable assurance of detecting instances of noncompliance with legal and regulatory requirements or noncompliance with provisions of contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies that are significant within the context of the audit objectives.

The results of our procedures indicated that, in all significant respects, the Fallowfield Township Non-Uniformed Union Pension Plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies, except as noted in the following finding further discussed later in this report:

Finding – Partial Compliance With Prior Audit Recommendation – Receipt Of State Aid In Excess Of Entitlement

The finding contained in this audit report repeats a condition that was cited in our previous audit report that has not been corrected by township officials. We are concerned by the township's failure to correct this previously reported finding and strongly encourage timely implementation of the recommendation noted in this audit report.

The contents of this report were discussed with officials of Fallowfield Township and, where appropriate, their responses have been included in the report. We would like to thank township officials for the cooperation extended to us during the conduct of the audit.

BACKGROUND

On December 18, 1984, the Pennsylvania Legislature adopted the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (P.L. 1005, No. 205, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.101 <u>et seq</u>.). The Act established mandatory actuarial reporting and funding requirements and a uniform basis for the distribution of state aid to Pennsylvania's public pension plans.

Annual state aid allocations are provided from a two percent foreign (out-of-state) casualty insurance premium tax, a portion of the foreign (out-of-state) fire insurance tax designated for paid firefighters and any investment income earned on the collection of these taxes. Generally, municipal pension plans established prior to December 18, 1984, are eligible for state aid. For municipal pension plans established after that date, the sponsoring municipality must fund the plan for three plan years before it becomes eligible for state aid. In accordance with Act 205, a municipality's annual state aid allocation cannot exceed its actual pension costs.

In addition to Act 205, the Fallowfield Township Non-Uniformed Union Pension Plan is also governed by implementing regulations published at Title 16, Part IV of the Pennsylvania Code and applicable provisions of various other state statutes.

As further described in the Letter from the Auditor General included in this report, the township's non-uniformed union employees participate in the Steelworker's Pension Trust. The Fallowfield Township Non-Uniformed Union Pension Plan is locally controlled by the provisions of collective bargaining agreements between the township and its non-uniformed employees. The plan was established October 29, 1991. Active members are not required to contribute to the plan. The municipality was required to contribute \$1.80 per hour per employee in 2020, \$1.85 per hour per employee in 2021, and \$1.95 per hour per employee in 2022. As of December 31, 2022, the plan had five active members.

FALLOWFIELD TOWNSHIP NON-UNIFORMED UNION PENSION PLAN STATUS OF PRIOR FINDING

Partial Compliance With Prior Recommendation

Fallowfield Township has partially complied with the prior recommendation concerning the following:

· <u>Receipt Of State Aid In Excess Of Entitlement</u>

During the current audit period, the township returned the excess state aid received in the years 2018 and 2019 to the Commonwealth. However, plan officials again received state aid in excess of the non-uniformed union pension plan's defined contribution pension costs as further discussed in the Finding and Recommendation section of this report.

FALLOWFIELD TOWNSHIP NON-UNIFORMED UNION PENSION PLAN FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION

<u>Finding – Partial Compliance With Prior Audit Recommendation – Receipt Of State Aid In</u> <u>Excess Of Entitlement</u>

<u>Condition</u>: As disclosed in the Status of Prior Finding section of this report, the township partially complied with the prior recommendation by returning excess state aid received in the years 2018 and 2019 to the Commonwealth. However, the township again received state aid in excess of the non-uniformed union pension plan's defined contribution pension costs in the year 2021, as illustrated below:

State aid allocation	\$ 17,154
Actual municipal pension costs	 (12,184)
Excess state aid	\$ 4,970

In addition, as of the fieldwork date, the 2021 excess state aid remained in the township's general fund according to municipal records.

Criteria: Section 402(f)(2) of Act 205 states:

No municipality shall be entitled to receive an allocation of general municipal pension system State aid in an amount which exceeds the aggregate actual financial requirements of any municipal pension plans for police officers, paid firefighters or employees other than police officers or paid firefighters maintained by the municipality, less the amount of any aggregate annual member or employee contributions during the next succeeding plan year, as reported in the most recent complete actuarial report filed with the commission.

<u>Cause</u>: Plan officials again failed to reconcile the township's state aid allocation with the plan's actual defined contribution pension costs.

<u>Effect</u>: It is this department's opinion that because the entire proceeds of the insurance premium tax on foreign casualty insurance companies are distributed annually to each eligible recipient municipality, it is inappropriate to use state aid in one year to offset pension costs in other years. Consequently, the overpayment of state aid in the year 2021 must be returned to the Commonwealth for redistribution.

FALLOWFIELD TOWNSHIP NON-UNIFORMED UNION PENSION PLAN FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION

Finding – (Continued)

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that the municipality return the \$4,970 of excess state aid received in the year 2021 to the Commonwealth from the township's general fund. A check in this amount, with interest compounded annually from date of receipt to date of repayment, at a rate earned by the plan, should be made payable to: Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and mailed to: Department of the Auditor General, Municipal Pension & Fire Relief Programs Unit, 321 Finance Building, Harrisburg, PA 17120. A copy of the interest calculation must be submitted along with evidence of payment.

Management's Response: Municipal officials agreed with the finding without exception.

<u>Auditor Conclusion</u>: Compliance will be monitored subsequent to the release of the audit report and through our next audit of the pension plan.
