Independent Auditor's Report

The Honorable Michael Carroll Secretary Department of Transportation Harrisburg, PA 17120

We examined the accompanying Form MS-965 With Adjustments for the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund of the Township of Donegal, Westmoreland County, for the period January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2022. The municipality's management is responsible for presenting the Form MS-965 in accordance with the criteria described in the Background section of this report and the Department of Transportation's *Publication 9*. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the Form MS-965 With Adjustments based on our examination.

Our examination was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the standards applicable to attestation engagements contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the examination to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the Form MS-965 is presented in accordance with the criteria described above, in all material respects. An examination involves performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Form MS-965. The nature, timing and extent of the procedures selected depend on our judgement, including an assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the Form MS-965, whether due to fraud or error. We believe that the evidence we obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a reasonable basis for our qualified opinion.

We are required to be independent and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with ethical requirements relating to the engagement.

<u>Independent Auditor's Report (Continued)</u>

As discussed in the Findings And Recommendations section of this report:

- The municipality expended \$14,456.19 during 2022 for the purchase of 9.5 MM wearing asphalt. However, documentation for price quotations was not available for examination (see Finding No. 1).
- The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania electronically deposited \$9,029.28 of Liquid Fuels Tax Fund money into the General Fund (see Finding No. 2).
- The municipality expended \$1,831.63 for the purchase of Type 3A modified stone, which is a nonpermissible expenditure (see Finding No. 3).

In our opinion, except for the bulleted matters discussed above, the Form MS-965 With Adjustments presents, in all material respects, the information required by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation for the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund of the Township of Donegal, Westmoreland County, for the period January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2022, in accordance with the criteria described in the Background section of this report and the Department of Transportation's *Publication 9*.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we are required to report all deficiencies that are considered to be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in internal control; fraud and noncompliance with provisions of laws or regulations that have a material effect on the Form MS-965; any other instances that warrant the attention of those charged with governance; noncompliance with provisions of contracts or grant agreements; and abuse that has a material effect on the Form MS-965. We are also required to obtain and report the views of responsible officials concerning the findings, conclusions, and recommendations, as well as any planned corrective actions. We performed our examination to express an opinion on whether the Form MS-965 is presented in accordance with the criteria described above and not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the internal control over reporting on the Form MS-965 or on compliance and other matters; accordingly, we express no such opinions.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Form MS-965 will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Independent Auditor's Report (Continued)

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Form MS-965 is free from material misstatement, we performed tests of the Township of Donegal, Westmoreland County's compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of amounts on the Form MS-965. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our engagement, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed the following instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*:

- Documentation For Price Quotations Was Not Available For Examination.
- Liquid Fuels Money Deposited Into The General Fund.
- Nonpermissible Expenditure.

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Background

The Liquid Fuels Tax Municipal Allocation Law, Act 655 of 1956, as amended, see also 72 P.S. § 2615.5, et sec., provides municipalities other than counties (i.e., townships, boroughs, cities, towns, home rule, and optional plan governments) with an annual allocation of liquid fuels taxes from the state's Motor License Fund to be used for the maintenance and repair of streets, roads, and bridges for which the municipality is responsible. The allocation of these funds to municipalities is based upon: (1) 50 percent on the municipality's proportion of local road mileage to the total local road mileage in the state; and (2) 50 percent on the proportion of a municipality's population to the total population in the state.

Title 75 Pa.C.S. § 9511 of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code provides municipalities with annual maintenance payments to be received from the Motor License Fund for functionally local highways that were transferred to a municipality from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Each municipality must deposit the allocation of Liquid Fuels Tax funds and annual maintenance payments that it receives into a special fund called either the Municipal Liquid Fuels Tax Fund or State Fund. A municipality may not deposit any other monies into this fund except when the municipality does not have enough money in the special fund to meet the payments called for by its current annual budget for road and bridge purposes. In such a case, the municipality may borrow money or transfer money from its General Fund to its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund.

The Department of Transportation has been given the regulatory authority for the administration of these funds. Department of Transportation's *Publication 9* includes the policies and procedures for the administration of Act 655, as amended, and the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund money. However, if there is a difference between *Publication 9* and any legislation, the legislation shall govern.

To qualify for the annual allocation of Liquid Fuels Tax funds, *Publication 9* indicates that each municipality shall:

- 1. Submit annual reports (MS-965, Actual Use Report, MS-965P, Project and Miscellaneous Receipts, and MS-965S, Record of Checks).
- 2. Make deposits and payments or expenditures in compliance with Act 655 of 1956, as amended. Failure to do so may result in not receiving allocations from PennDOT until all discrepancies are resolved. *Publication 9*, Section 2.6, includes information about investing Liquid Fuels Tax monies, using loan or bond proceeds, and types of receipts into the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund.

Background (Continued)

- 3. Submit the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development's (DCED) Report of Elected and Appointed Officials by January 31st and the Survey of Financial Condition By March 15th.
- 4. Ensure resolution of all Contractor Responsibility Program (CRP) holds and blocks imposed by the Department of Revenue and the Department of Labor and Industry.
- 5. Ensure resolution of all reimbursements required as a result of audits performed by the Department of the Auditor General or monitoring reviews performed by the Department of Transportation's Financial Consultants.

Criteria

The criteria for the Form MS-965 With Adjustment are described below.

Section 1 of Form MS-965 With Adjustments provides a summary of Liquid Fuels Tax Fund expenditures by category. Categories requiring explanation include:

• Major equipment purchases are purchases of road machinery and road equipment with varying yearly costs in excess of the amounts indicated below:

• Minor equipment purchases are purchases of road machinery and road equipment with varying yearly costs that are less than or equal to the amounts indicated below:

• Agility projects are exchanges of services with the Department of Transportation.

Background (Continued)

Section 2 of Form MS-965 With Adjustments provides information on the fund balance. Categories requiring explanation include:

- The state allocation is available from the Department of Transportation in March of each year. The amount the municipality receives is based half on its population and half on its road mileage.
- Municipalities that transferred roads from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to the municipality through the Highway Transfer Program receive annual turnback allocations in March of each year from the Department of Transportation. Turnback allocations are based on the mileage of the roads transferred.
- Expenditures include the total transferred from Section 1.

Section 3 of Form MS-965 With Adjustments determines if the municipality expended Liquid Fuels Tax Fund money in excess of the permissible amount for equipment and the balance that the municipality may carry forward for the purchase of equipment to the subsequent year.

Department of Transportation *Publication 9* requires that the amount expended for equipment purchases in a given year not exceed the sum of the equipment balance carried forward from the previous year and 20 percent of the current year's Liquid Fuels Tax Fund allocation and, if applicable, 20 percent of the turnback allocation plus other Department of Transportation approved adjustments.

If the municipality spent in excess of the amount listed on Line 4, the excess must be reimbursed to the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund.

The equipment balance to be carried forward for the subsequent year is the lesser of the amount on Line 6 or the ending fund balance on Line 6 of Section 2, but not less than zero.

Background (Continued)

Basis of Presentation

The financial activities of the municipality are accounted for in separate funds. The Liquid Fuels Tax Fund is used to account for state aid revenues from the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation used primarily for building and improving local roads and bridges. The Form MS-965 has been prepared in accordance with reporting requirements prescribed by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation as a result of the Fuels Tax Act 655, dated 1956 and as amended, which does not constitute a complete presentation of the entity's assets, liabilities, expenses, and fund balance. Accordingly, the presentation of Form MS-965 With Adjustments is restricted to the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund, which represents a segment of the entity.

Basis Of Accounting

The accompanying Form MS-965 With Adjustments is prepared in accordance with reporting requirements prescribed by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation. Under this method, revenues are recognized when received and expenditures are recorded when paid.

General Fixed Assets

General fixed assets are recognized as expenditures at the time of purchase. No depreciation has been provided on the heavy equipment used to maintain and repair roads and bridges.

TOWNSHIP OF DONEGAL WESTMORELAND COUNTY LIQUID FUELS TAX FUND AUDITOR DESCRIPTION OF SELECT TRANSACTIONS FOR THE PERIOD JANUARY 1, 2022 TO DECEMBER 31, 2022

The following information relates to certain types of transactions for which the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation requested that we provide additional detail:

Miscellaneous Receipts

On March 3, 2022, the municipality deposited \$3,351.32 into its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund that was received from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for an NBIS bridge inspection reimbursement.

Finding No. 1 - Documentation For Price Quotations Was Not Available For Examination

Our examination disclosed that the township expended \$14,456.19 during 2022 from the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund for the purchase of 9.5 MM wearing asphalt. The township was required to obtain three written or telephonic price quotations for this expenditure. However, documentation for price quotations was not available for examination.

The above expenditure was not made in compliance with the contract requirements of *The Second Class Township Code*, 53 P.S. § 68102(b), (also found at § 3102(b) of *The Second Class Township Code* as published by the Local Government Commission), which states, in part:

Written or telephonic price quotations from at least three qualified and responsible contractors shall be requested for all contracts [during 2022] that exceed eleven thousand eight hundred dollars (\$11,800.00) but are less than the amount [in excess of \$21,900.00] requiring advertisement and competitive bidding or, in lieu of price quotations, a memorandum shall be kept on file showing that fewer than three qualified contractors exist in the market area within which it is practicable to obtain quotations. A written record of telephonic price quotations shall be made and shall contain at least the date of the quotation, the name of the contractor and the contractor's representative, the construction, reconstruction, repair, maintenance, or work which was the subject of the quotation and the price. Written price quotations, written records of telephonic price quotations and memoranda shall be retained for a period of three years.

The thresholds for obtaining price quotations increased to purchases between \$11,800.00 and \$21,900.00 for 2022, and \$12,200.00 and \$22,500.00 for 2023, and \$12,600.00 and \$23,200.00 for 2024.

The condition occurred because COSTARS approved Vendor A, who the municipality usually purchases 9.5 MM wearing asphalt from, shut down for winter and could not provide the material. The municipality then purchased the material from Vendor B but did not have any supporting documentation to prove they obtained quotes or that the vendor was COSTARS approved.

The failure to comply with *The Second Class Township Code* could result in the township having to reimburse \$14,456.19 to its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund.

<u>Finding No. 1 - Documentation For Price Quotations Was Not Available For Examination</u> (Continued)

Recommendations

We recommend that the township reimburse \$14,456.19 to its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund upon official notification by the Department of Transportation.

We further recommend that the township comply with *The Second Class Township Code* as noted in this finding.

Management's Response

The township secretary/treasurer stated:

No bids for spot paving. It was an oversight.

Auditor's Conclusion

During our next examination, we will determine if the municipality complied with our recommendations.

Finding No. 2 - Liquid Fuels Money Deposited Into The General Fund

Our examination disclosed that the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania electronically deposited \$9,029.28 of Liquid Fuels Tax Fund money into the General Fund on December 27, 2022, which is in noncompliance with the Liquid Fuels Tax Municipal Allocation Law. These funds represented the 80 percent reimbursement due for bridge inspection estimate No. 7 for \$11,286.60 paid from the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund on September 14, 2022.

The practice of depositing liquid fuels money into any account other than the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund account is contrary to the Act of June 1, 1956, P.L. (1955) 1944, 72 P.S. § 2615.5, known as the Liquid Fuels Tax Municipal Allocation Law, which states:

...each city, borough, town and township, shall ... Establish and maintain a special fund into which the moneys [liquid fuels tax funds] ... shall be deposited and into which no other moneys may be deposited or commingled . . .

The condition of the finding occurred due to oversight and not looking into why the deposit for bridge inspection was not deposited into the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund.

The risk that Liquid Fuels Tax Fund money may be used for unauthorized purposes increases when liquid fuels money is commingled with other funds.

The failure to follow the Liquid Fuels Tax Municipal Allocation Law as noted above could result in the municipality having to reimburse \$9,029.28 to its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund.

Recommendations

We recommend that the municipality reimburse \$9,029.28 to its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund upon official notification by the Department of Transportation.

We also recommend that the municipality deposit all liquid fuels tax money promptly into the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund.

Finding No. 2 - Liquid Fuels Money Deposited Into The General Fund (Continued)

Management's Response

The township secretary/treasurer stated:

Liquid Fuels money put into the General Fund by mistake. It will be deposited into the State Fund.

Auditor's Conclusion

During our next examination, we will determine if the municipality complied with our recommendations.

Finding No. 3 - Nonpermissible Expenditure

Our examination disclosed that the municipality expended \$1,831.63 during 2022 from the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund for the purchase of Type 3A Modified stone, which is a nonpermissible expenditure.

Stone approved by the Department of Transportation are listed in the Department of Transportation Specifications *Publication 408*, Section 703.2. Type 2A and 3A Modified stone is not approved for use by municipalities in *Publication 408*.

The condition occurred due to an oversight and failing to refer to *Publication 408* for approved materials to purchase.

The failure to purchase stone that is approved by the Department of Transportation could result in the municipality having to reimburse \$1,831.63 to its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund.

Recommendations

We recommend that the municipality reimburse \$1,831.63 to its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund upon official notification by the Department of Transportation.

We further recommend that the municipality purchase stone that is approved by the Department of Transportation.

Management's Response

The township secretary/treasurer stated:

Buying modified 3A stone was a mistake by the supervisors for not checking with the Department of Transportation for approved stone.

Auditor's Conclusion

During our next examination, we will determine if the municipality complied with our recommendations.
