Dear Mr. Speicher and Mr. Conrad:

We conducted a Limited Procedures Engagement (LPE) of the Butler County Area Vocational-Technical School (AVTS) to determine its compliance with certain relevant state laws, regulations, policies, and administrative procedures (relevant requirements). The LPE covers the period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2015, except for any areas of compliance that may have required an alternative to this period. The engagement was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. §§ 402 and 403), but was not conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our LPE procedures, we sought to determine answers to the following questions, which serve as our LPE objectives:

- Did the AVTS have documented board policies and administrative procedures related to the following?
 - Internal controls
 - o Budgeting practices
 - o The Right-to-Know Law
 - o The Sunshine Act
- Were the policies and procedures adequate and appropriate, and have they been properly implemented?
- Did the AVTS comply with the relevant requirements in the Right-to-Know Law and the Sunshine Act?

The mission of the Butler County Area Vocational-Technical School is to empower students with the skills necessary for continuous development, education, and employment.


The operation, administration, and management of the AVTS are directed by a joint operating committee (JOC), which is comprised of 12 members from the following school districts:


Butler Area	Seneca Valley








Note: General Fund Balance is comprised of the District's Committed, Assigned and Unassigned Fund Balances.



Note: Career and technical centers do not make payments to charter schools for tuition. These payments are made by the home district of each student.

Financial Information Continued



Local revenues were primarily obtained from direct payments by the member districts based on the approved budget. Each district's proportionate share of the operating expenditures was determined by a formula involving average daily membership as specified in the Articles of Agreement.

Academic Information

School Performance Profile (SPP) benchmarks represent the statewide average of all district school buildings in the Commonwealth. Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) benchmarks and goals are determined by PDE each school year and apply to all public school entities.²

Part-time career and technical centers, such as the AVTS, do not receive academic scores. Academic instruction in the core content areas occurs in the students' home district and are therefore reported within the scores of the students' home district.³ Full-time comprehensive career and technical centers providing core content receive academic scores.

4 Year Cohort Graduation Rates

Part-time career and technical centers do not report a graduation rate. Each students' graduation rate is reported through the home district for that student. Full-time comprehensive career and technical centers report graduation rates to PDE.

¹ Statewide averages for SPP scores were calculated based on all district school buildings throughout the Commonwealth, excluding charter and cyber charter schools.

² PSSA benchmarks apply to all district school buildings, charters, and cyber charters. In the 2011-12 school year, the state benchmarks reflect the Adequate Yearly Progress targets established under No Child Left Behind. In the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, the state benchmarks reflect the statewide goals based on annual measurable objectives established by PDE.
