Dear Dr. Bjalobok and Mrs. Beale:

We conducted a Limited Procedures Engagement (LPE) of the Highlands School District (District) to determine its compliance with certain relevant state laws, regulations, policies, and administrative procedures (relevant requirements). The LPE covers the period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2015, except for any areas of compliance that may have required an alternative to this period. The engagement was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. §§ 402 and 403), but was not conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our LPE procedures, we sought to determine answers to the following questions, which serve as our LPE objectives:

- Did the District have documented board policies and administrative procedures related to the following?
 - Internal controls
 - o Budgeting practices
 - o The Right-to-Know Law
 - The Sunshine Act
- Were the policies and procedures adequate and appropriate, and have they been properly implemented?
- Did the District comply with the relevant requirements in the Right-to-Know Law and the Sunshine Act?
- Did the District take appropriate corrective action to address the finding and observation made in our prior audit?

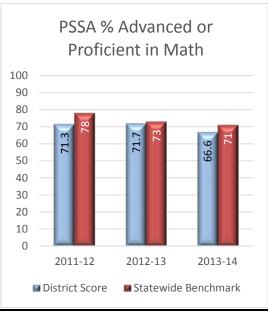
The following table and charts consist of School Performance Profile (SPP) scores and Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) results for the entire District obtained from PDE's data files. These scores are presented in the District's audit report for **informational purposes only**, and they were not audited by our Department.

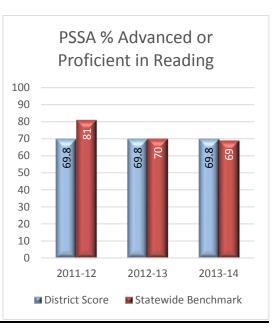
SPP benchmarks represent the statewide average of all district school buildings in the Commonwealth.² PSSA benchmarks and goals are determined by PDE each school year and apply to all public school entities.³ District SPP and PSSA scores were calculated using an average of all of the individual school buildings within the District. Scores below SPP statewide averages and PSSA benchmarks/goals are presented in red.

³ PSSA benchmarks apply to all district school buildings, charters, and cyber charters. In the 2011-12 school year, the state benchmarks reflect the Adequate Yearly Progress targets established under No Child Left Behind. In the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, the state benchmarks reflect the statewide goals based on annual measurable objectives established by PDE.

⁴ The following letter grades are based on a 0-100 point system: A (90-100), B (80-89), C (70-79), D (60-69), F (59 or below).

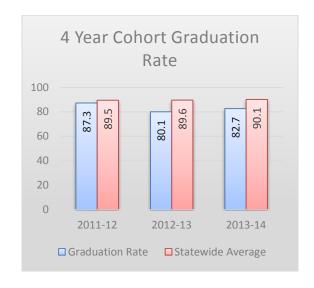

4 Year Cohort Graduation Rates

The cohort graduation rates are a calculation of the percentage of students who have graduated with a regular high school diploma within a designated number of years since the student first entered high school. The rate is determined for a cohort of students who have all entered high school for the first time during the same school year.⁶

Status of Prior Audit Findings and Observations

Our prior audit of the District released on June 26, 2014, resulted in one finding and one observation, as shown below. As part of our current engagement, we determined the status of corrective action taken by the District to implement our prior audit recommendations. We interviewed District personnel and performed audit procedures as detailed in each status section below.

Auditor General Performance Audit Report Released on June 26, 2014

Prior Finding: Membership Reporting Errors and a Lack of Internal Controls

Resulted in the District Not Receiving Their Entitled

Reimbursement

Prior Finding Summary: During our prior audit, we found student membership reports

submitted to PDE by the District, for the 2008-09 through 2011-12 school years, contained reporting errors and a lack of documentation to support the residency classification for the children placed in private

homes (foster children).

Prior Recommendations: Our prior audit finding recommended that the District should:

- 1. Establish internal controls that include reconciliations of the data that is uploaded into PDE's Pennsylvania Information Management System (PIMS) with the information in the District's student information system.
- 2. Request additional training from PDE to ensure that the personnel tasked with PIMS reporting thoroughly understand PDE's guidelines and instructions.
- 3. Strengthen controls over the enrollment process to ensure pupil membership residency is reported in accordance with PDE guidelines and instructions.
- 4. Gather and reconcile all letters from agencies for reported foster children and ensure that proper data pertaining to these students has the location where the natural parents reside and if a stipend is received for those students. This will ensure the District reported membership for these students is properly classified.
- 5. Review reports submitted subsequent to the years and submit revised reports to PDE, if errors are found.

We also recommended that PDE should:

- 6. Review the District's \$45,124 tuition payment and determine the appropriateness of the entitlement.
- 7. Adjust the District's future allocations to correct the \$9,170 underpayment of tuition for foster children.

Current Status:

During our current review, we found that the District has implemented the recommendations from our prior audit. The District has established internal controls that include reconciliation of data uploaded to PIMS prior to submission. District officials responsible for PIMS entry and submission of PIMS data to PDE have been provided training on these subjects. In addition, the District continues to obtain and reconcile agency letters to ensure that foster students are properly classified. The District reviewed subsequent years of membership reports submitted to PDE and did not find errors. However, as of the last day of our current review, February 10, 2017, PDE has not implemented our recommendations. We again recommend that PDE makes adjustments to future allocations to correct the \$9,170 underpayment. PDE should also ensure that they are provided adequate supporting documentation from the District to determine the appropriateness of the \$45,124 entitlement.

Prior Observation:

Transportation Contractor Paid Over State Formula

Prior Observation Summary:

During our prior audit of the District's contracted student transportation costs for the school years ending June 30, 2009, through June 30, 2012, we found that the contracted costs paid to one of the District's transportation contractors was substantially more than PDE's final formula allowance, which is used to determine reimbursement of pupil transportation services.

Prior Recommendations: Our prior audit observation recommended the District should:

- 1. Ensure that, prior to negotiating a new contract, the Board of School Directors and administrative personnel are cognizant of the state's final formula allowance cost formula.
- 2. Routinely seek competitive bids for all of the District's pupil transportation services to ensure the most efficient cost to the District and its taxpayers.

- 3. Prepare pupil transportation contracts to ensure the local share is as minimal as possible by establishing the base rate and increases in line with PDE's final formula allowance for all pupil transportation costs.
- 4. Have District personnel continuously monitor and justify any increase in the District's pupil transportation costs.

Current Status:

The District's prior transportation contract expired June 30, 2015, and again the District did not seek competitive bids for this service. The District renewed their transportation contract with the same vendor. The current contract is in effect for the 2015-16 through 2018-19 school years. District officials stated that since they are not required to bid for transportation services and the District is satisfied with their current vendor that they did not consider seeking competitive bids. While the District is correct that the Public School Code does not require districts to seek competitive bids for transportation, we continue to recommend that the District seek competitive bids for this service in an effort to reduce transportation costs. By seeking competitive bids for this service, the District could possibly reduce transportation costs and bring transportation costs closer to PDE's final formula cost allowance.
