Dear Mr. Wehrer and Ms. Youngblood:

We conducted a Limited Procedures Engagement (LPE) of the Steel Valley School District (District) to determine its compliance with certain relevant state laws, regulations, policies, and administrative procedures (relevant requirements). The LPE covers the period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2015, except for any areas of compliance that may have required an alternative to this period. The engagement was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and The Fiscal Code, 72 P.S. §§ 402 and 403, but was not conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our LPE procedures, we sought to determine answers to the following questions, which serve as our LPE objectives:

- Did the District have documented board policies and administrative procedures related to the following?
 - Internal controls
 - Budgeting practices
 - The Right-to-Know Law
 - The Sunshine Act
- Were the policies and procedures adequate and appropriate, and have they been properly implemented?
- Did the District comply with the relevant requirements in the Right-to-Know Law and the Sunshine Act?
- Did the District take appropriate corrective action to address the finding made in our prior audit?

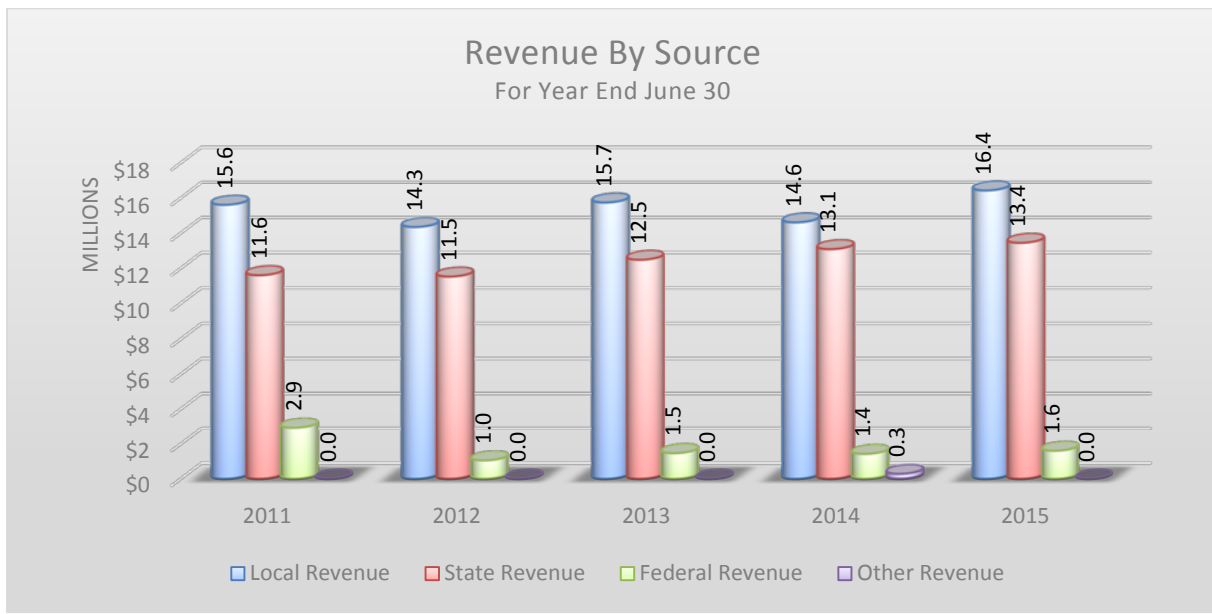
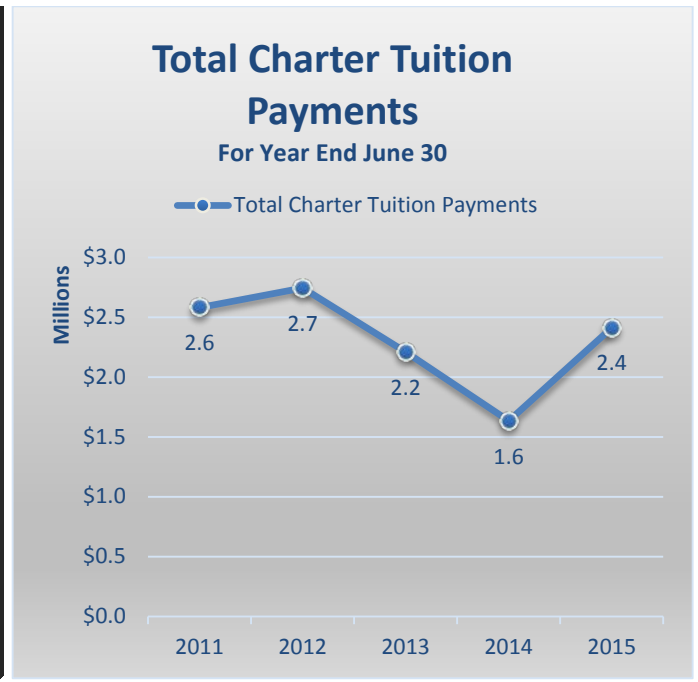
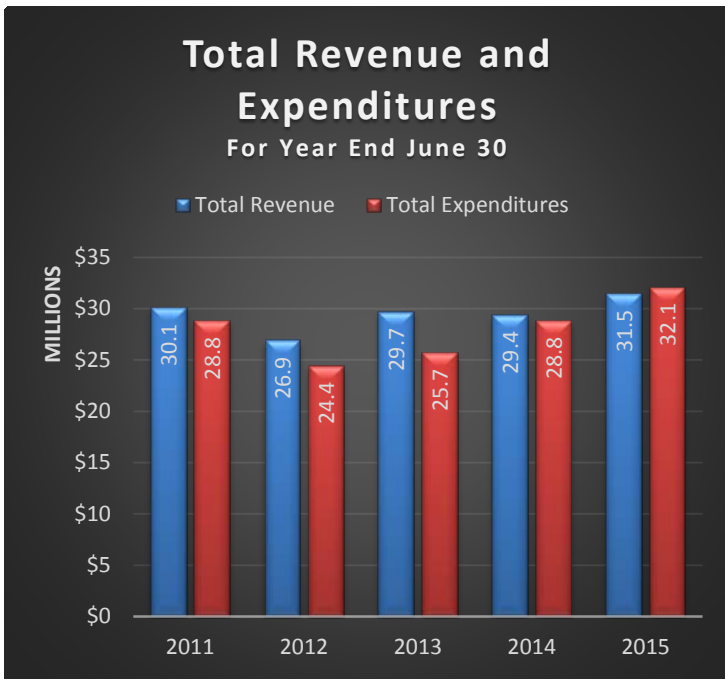
Note: General Fund Balance is comprised of the District's Committed, Assigned and Unassigned Fund Balances.

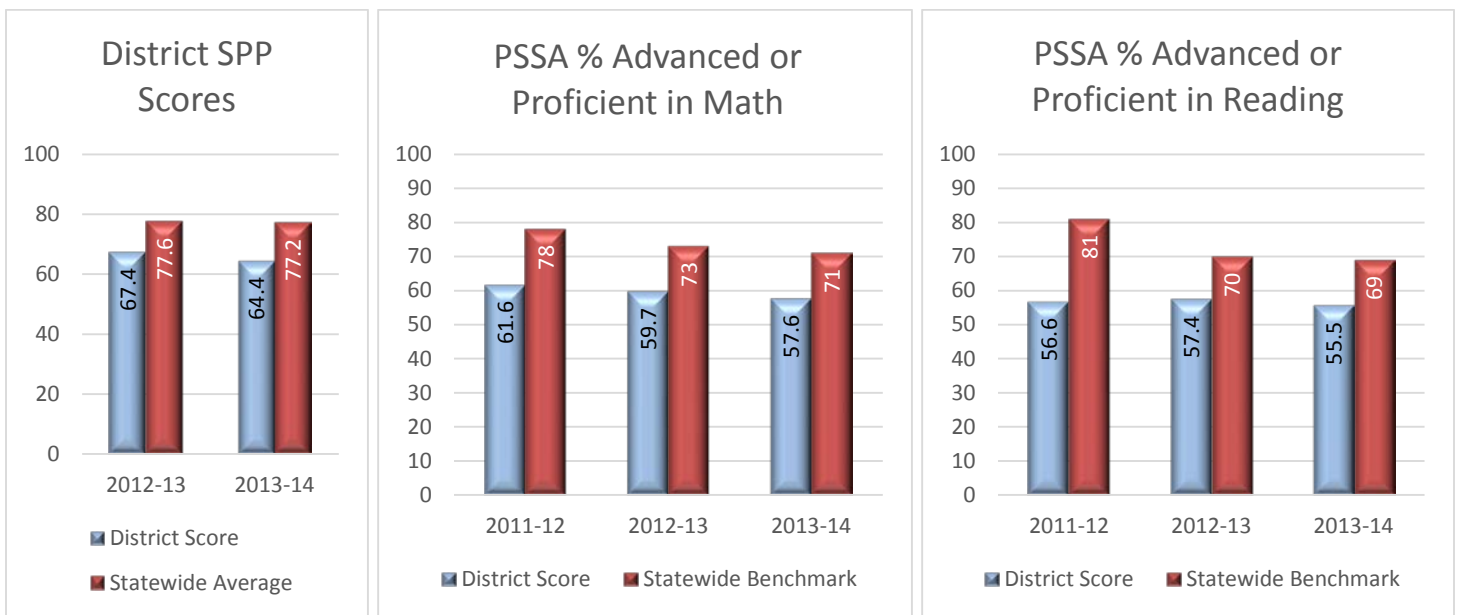
Academic Information

The following table and charts consist of School Performance Profile (SPP) scores and Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) results for the entire District obtained from PDE's data files.² These scores are presented in the District's audit report for **informational purposes only**, and they were not audited by our Department.

SPP benchmarks represent the statewide average of all district school buildings in the Commonwealth.³ PSSA benchmarks and goals are determined by PDE each school year and apply to all public school entities.⁴ District SPP and PSSA scores were calculated using an average of all of the individual school buildings within the District. Scores below SPP statewide averages and PSSA benchmarks/goals are presented in red.

³ Statewide averages for SPP scores were calculated based on all district school buildings throughout the Commonwealth, excluding charter and cyber charter schools.

⁴ PSSA benchmarks apply to all district school buildings, charters, and cyber charters. In the 2011-12 school year, the state benchmarks reflect the Adequate Yearly Progress targets established under No Child Left Behind. In the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, the state benchmarks reflect the statewide goals based on annual measurable objectives established by PDE.

⁵ The following letter grades are based on a 0-100 point system: A (90-100), B (80-89), C (70-79), D (60-69), F (59 or below).

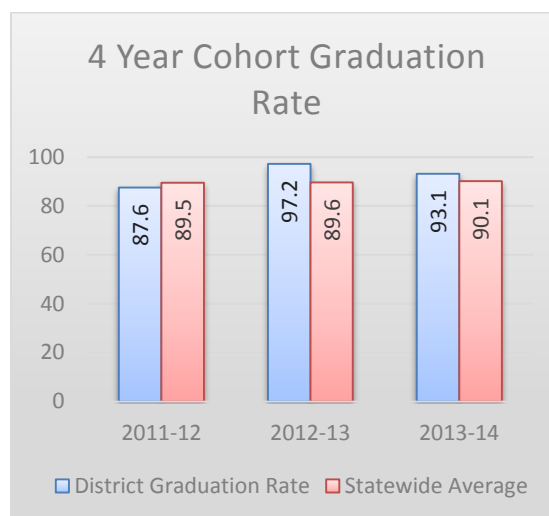

4 Year Cohort Graduation Rates

The cohort graduation rates are a calculation of the percentage of students who have graduated with a regular high school diploma within a designated number of years since the student first entered high school. The rate is determined for a cohort of students who have all entered high school for the first time during the same school year.⁷

Status of Prior Audit Findings and Observations

Our prior audit of the District released on September 23, 2013, resulted in one finding as shown below. As part of our current engagement, we determined the status of corrective action taken by the District to implement our prior audit recommendations. We interviewed District personnel and performed audit procedures as detailed in each status section below.

Auditor General Performance Audit Report Released on September 23, 2013

Prior Finding: **Memoranda of Understanding with Local Law Enforcement Not Updated Timely**

Prior Finding Summary: Our prior audit found that the Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) between the District and one local law enforcement agency had not been updated since August 19, 2009. Furthermore, the District still had not updated its MOUs with two other local law enforcement agencies since March 4, 1996.

Prior Recommendations: Our prior audit recommended that the District should:

1. In consultation with the District's solicitor, immediately review, update, and re-execute the current MOUs between the District and all local law enforcement agencies that have jurisdiction over school property.
2. In consultation with the District's solicitor, immediately review new requirements for MOUs and other school safety areas under the Public School Code to ensure compliance with amended safe schools provisions.
3. Adopt an official board policy requiring District administration to biennially update and re-execute all MOUs with local law enforcement agencies and file a copy with PDE's Office of Safe Schools on a biennial basis, as now required by law.

Current Status: Our current review found that the District has implemented our first two recommendations, and all MOUs held with local law enforcement are current as of April 11, 2017. The District has not adopted an official policy as stated in the third recommendation but are aware of the current laws to re-execute the MOUs biennially. We continue to recommend that the District adopt an official board policy to address these biennial updates, executions, and filings of all MOUs.
